

REVIEW OF THE 2023-24 YEAR

Curriculum and School Development

Our school continues to provide a broad and balanced curriculum for all of our pupils.

We welcomed Mr Derek Harkness from the CSSC to lead our staff in a workshop which focused on the Ethos of Killen Primary School. Through consultation with Governors, parents and staff we updated our Ethos Statement:

We at Killen Primary School believe pupils should have access to a safe, happy, stimulating environment in which they reach their full potential, socially, emotionally, and academically. Furthermore, the values of respect, kindness, equality and mutual understanding are the foundations of the school.

With the support of our school community, we continue to realise our vision.

Killen Primary School strives to be a safe welcoming, child-centred, inclusive school family celebrating success for all. We encourage each child to be confident and develop a sense of responsibility for themselves and respect for others in the community.

Pupil voice is of great importance to us. Children were given the task of creating a slogan that they thought would best describe our school. We were delighted with the number of responses and quality of input from the children. The following slogan was adopted for Killen Primary School.

Kids' Pathway to Success

We currently teach the Northern Ireland Revised Curriculum that has been subdivided into various areas. This is available for download at <u>www.nicurriculum.org</u>. Teachers are mindful that each child is an individual and will seek to provide the opportunities at a suitable level for each pupil to ensure holistic development.

The areas of the curriculum for Foundation Stage (Year 1 and 2)

- LL Language and Literacy
- MN Mathematics and Numeracy
- A The Arts
- WAU The World Around Us
- PDMU Personal Development and Mutual Understanding
- PDM Physical Development and Movement
- RE Religious Education

In Key Stage 1 (Year 3 and 4) and Key Stage 2 (Year 5, 6 and 7), the areas are as above except that PDM is entitled PE – Physical Education at these stages.

We thank all of the local ministers for coming into our school and delivering a number of our assemblies each month. We also thank Mrs Heather Watson and Mrs Ruth Kerrigan for coming into our school and delivering assemblies and Good News Club to the children. Support from our local church and clergy in the community is very much valued and appreciated.

Thanks to Geoffrey Abraham for coming in to work with Year 6/7 pupils to broaden their understanding of the dangers of alcohol, smoking and drugs. Mr Abraham also completed sessions on Mindfulness and peer pressure.

Staff will provide pupils with learning opportunities to ensure they receive a broad and balanced education. Staff will ensure that pupils are provided with the opportunity to develop thinking skills – tools that go beyond the acquisition of knowledge to search for meaning, apply ideas, analyse patterns and relationships, create and design something new and monitor and evaluate their own progress.

Staff engaged in whole school training with Mrs Anne McErlane focusing on the area of the World Around Us, developing a thematic, skills based and cross curricular approach, linking to our writing scheme. All teaching staff have now received training and completed cycle 2 of the scheme during the 23-24 school year. Children take charge of their learning and participate in carousel planning lessons, selecting the aspects of the theme which they want to find out more about, giving them ownership of their learning. Teachers will now implement cycle 1 with the children in the 24-25 school year.

Following training in our 6 step approach relating to writing, the teachers have now completed cycle 2 with the children, focusing on 3 of the main genres of writing. Staff are now competent in following the 6 stages when teaching writing to the children – familiarizing, analyzing, modelled, shared, guided and independent. Staff will continue to implement the scheme with the children during 24-25, focusing on the 3 remaining genres – report writing, instructional and recount writing.

Staff and pupils availed of training provided by Adobe facilitators. Pupils enjoyed these practical workshops and having the opportunity to explore the programme. Staff who attended training were also successful in achieving a Level 1 in Adobe Creative Cloud ACE. We hope to develop our skills as a whole school throughout 24-25 in using Adobe.

This year 3 pupils sat the SEAG test. All pupils were accepted by their first preference schools, including Castlederg High School, Omagh Academy and Strabane Academy. We thank those children, along with their parents for all their hard work. We would ask that parents carefully consider whether their child should go through extra classes and the test itself if they do not want a grammar school place for their child. This is extra work and pressure for the pupils, parents and teachers involved.

End of Key Stage Assessment 2023-2024

The Department of Education did not require End of Key Stage Levels to be submitted.

Learning Support

Within each class teachers endeavour to provide for the full range of abilities by differentiating their teaching, ensuring that pupils have access to all areas of the curriculum and are taught using a wide range of learning and teaching strategies. A measure of individual support is maintained through the use of classroom assistants. Outside agencies have continued to work with children with special educational needs. Mrs Mitchell has continued her hard work as role of SENCO supporting staff, overseeing the annual review process collaborating with outside agencies and liaising

needs. Mrs Mitchell has continued her hard work as role of SENCO supporting staff, overseeing the annual review process, collaborating with outside agencies and liaising with the Educational Psychologist.

Shared Education

Killen Primary School participates in Shared Education alongside a number of other schools in the locality – Ardstraw Primary School, St. Caireall's, Langfield, St. Joseph's and Castlederg High School. Year 1 pupils enjoyed exploring outdoor play opportunities and visited St Caireall's to engage in outdoor play activities. We also welcomed their Year 1 pupils' for an outdoor play session at our school. Year 7 pupils focused on the topic of diversity looking in particular at examples of diversity in our local area. Pupils travelled to Castlederg High School to further their understanding through participating in a variety of workshops and presented a power point showing examples of diversity in Castlederg and the surrounding area.

We look forward to continuing to develop relationships with all colleagues and pupils in the cluster group.

Attendance

Congratulations to all those children who achieved their full attendance certificates. Attendance for the 2023-24 year was 95.8%. The school continues to use the C2k computer system for attendance where any absence is recorded using a variety of codes depending on the reason for the absence. To enable the system to work properly we ask that a written note, phone call to school or a private message via Seesaw is sent to school to explain any absence. This will avoid the school having to contact parents asking for an explanation of absences. The system operates on registration twice daily, morning and after lunch. We remind parents to book family

holidays during school closures, not during the school term. We also remind parents of the importance of regular attendance. Please note if a pupil's attendance rate is approaching 85% a letter of concern will be sent home from the school. If poor attendance continues and falls below 85%, the next step in the procedure is that Mrs Goan will liaise with the Education Welfare Officer. Good attendance at school is not just valuable, it's essential.

Health, Safety and Security

Site security is excellent with the school grounds being fenced off and gates locked each evening. Children access through three external doors which are locked at 9.15 a.m. Playground gates are also locked at 9.15am. Parents wishing to collect their children early must sign their children out using the book available at the office. All visitors access is through the front entrance and visitors must report to reception. A monitored intruder alarm protects the building, this system was upgraded throughout the course of the year. The waste bins are secured away from the building as a fire prevention measure. There are regular checks of the fire bell carried out as well as termly fire drills.

Accessibility

To facilitate access arrangements, a disabled parking bay is available directly in front of the front entrance and all doors are suitable for disabled access. A disabled toilet is also available. The school building consists of one level.

Outdoor Learning

We are extremely lucky to have spacious grounds and lots of opportunities for outdoor learning. Teachers understand the importance of outdoor learning and the positive impact this has on mental health. All classes have engaged in hands on outdoor activities to help them connect to their environment and foster their creativity and curiosity.

Safeguarding and Child Protection

Mrs C Mitchell remained as designated teacher for child protection for 23 - 24 school year, with Mrs Goan and Mrs L Palmer as deputies. There will be a shuffle of responsibilities for the 24-25 school year with Mrs. L Palmer taking up the role of designated teacher for Child Protection and Mrs. C Goan and Mrs C Mitchell as deputy designated teachers. All staff child protection training is currently up to date.

Mental Health

Thanks to the Gemma McHale Foundation we were able to continue to have Anne, our school counsellor, to work with targeted children and Shannon from Relax Kids to work with our Foundation and KS1 pupils. EA Reach also provided workshops for our Key Stage 2 Pupils which centred around developing self-esteem and confidence as well as friendships. We are so grateful to have this support from the McHale Foundation as it provides invaluable opportunities for the children to learn strategies to support emotional resilience and wellbeing as well as learning how to cope with the emotions that they may experience at different times throughout their life.

We also welcomed Avril from Debutots to carry out some sessions with our younger classes which the children really enjoyed.

Year 6 children completed a block of sessions on PAWS b. This was provided by Aware NI, providing the children with strategies to find peace and calm and healthy coping strategies for everyday worries, allowing them to understand their own mind. As a whole school we continued to celebrate mental health week. Our calm room is also a valuable area which children can go to, should they need to emotionally selfregulate or have a brain break.

After School Clubs

We were delighted to have a good programme of after school clubs in operation for the 23/24 school year. These included cookery, football, Mini Messi's, after class, multi sports and Good News Club.

Tournaments/Competitions/ Community

Children participated in a variety of tournaments including football and cross country. Pupils throughout the school entered work for Omagh Show with many pupils having success. We were delighted to win the Wright Shield for the quality of our contributions as well as having best exhibit in both Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2. A number of pupils were successful in having their art entries published in a book which showcased their ideal pet, with Sesandi having her image published on the front cover as the best overall entry. Year 7 pupils represented Killen PS in the annual Road Safety Competition and did brilliantly, achieving 3rd place in the Derry and Strabane heat. Members of our school community attended the annual Remembrance Day Service, laying a wreath on behalf of the school. Key Stage 2 children created art work which is on display in The Royal British Legion, Castlederg. We had winning entries in the Sustrans competition which required the children to create a poster on the theme of 'Clean Air'. Their posters can be viewed at the depo in Londonderry. Three children also had success in the Christmas card competition, organized by the Ulster Farmers Union, having their designs created into actual Christmas cards. Members of our school community represented Killen PS at the annual Christmas community event held in Castlederg and also at church community events.

Children in Y5-7 had the opportunity to participate in choral speaking with the Ulster Scots. Matthew Warwick facilitated a number of workshops with the children looking at the Ulster Scots language and culture. The children then travelled to the Somme Memorial Hall to compete in a choral speaking competition with Gortin Primary School. We were delighted to win some prizes. The children also featured on BBC Radio Ulster (Kintra) and were so excited to hear extracts of our classroom workshops and interviews carried out by Helen feature on the show.

<u>ECO</u>

We thank Mrs Palmer and the ECO team for their continued hard work. Their project of collecting plastic bottle tops has got the community working hard, resulting in a large number of earth tokens being achieved, which allowed us to get 2 planters, 2 small tables and 6 chairs. We will continue to participate in this worthwhile project. Thanks to Donna McFeely from Sustrans for working with us this year throughout the school to promote awareness of active travel and a healthier lifestyle. Children were involved in a variety of workshops and also had great fun with the paint bike supplied by Donna.

We were delighted to achieve our fifth green flag, thanks to the ongoing hard work of Mrs Palmer and the Eco-council. Killen PS were also recognized as the top school in the North West for participation in Active Travel week and were awarded 2 bikes by Sustrans in recognition of this. Commitment and hard work from our pupils and staff relating to active travel and promotion of a healthy lifestyle also resulted in Killen PS achieving the Silver Sustrans Mark Award. The highlight of 23-24 for us was when
